Recent Rule Adoption, effective 7-23-22


- State-Initiated Revisions
 - Clarifications and corrections
 - Elimination of HW Facility Siting Board
- Universal Waste Aerosol Cans
- Pharmaceuticals Rule





Universal Waste Aerosol Cans

- Added aerosol cans to NH's list of Universal Wastes
- Aerosol cans that contain HW can be managed under protective but less stringent requirements.
- NH SQGs (federal VSQGs) might want to manage as HW





Hazardous Waste Pharmaceuticals

- Streamlined requirements to better fit the healthcare sector.
- Healthcare facilities that are NH FQGs (federal LQGs and SQGs) and reverse distributors must operate under Env-Hw 1300.
- Healthcare facilities that are NH SQGs (federal VSQGs) can opt into Env-Hw 1300.





Authorization Status

- States can request authorization to administer RCRA on EPA's behalf
- Last authorized in 2019
- Federal Register Notice published Aug 15, 2023
 - Comments due Sept 14, 2023

Upcoming Rulemaking (Winter 2023/24)



<u>Used Oil Management</u>

- 40 CFR 279
- Alignment with federal provisions
- Adoption of standards for processors/ re-refiners, aggregation points, and commercial collection centers
- Related rules in Env-Hw 1000: UO grants under RSA 147-B:13



Upcoming Rulemaking (Winter 2023/24) - continued

Generator Improvements Rule

- 40 CFR 262
- Greater clarity, improved risk communication
- Episodic generation provisions under consideration
- Federal Generator Categories:

NH SQG \rightarrow VSQG NH FQG \rightarrow SQG or LQG

Rule Readoption

- Solid Waste Management Rules: Env-Sw 100 – 2100
- Recently updated
 - Solid Waste Operator Certification
 - Landfill and Incinerator Closure Grants
- Most expire July 1, 2024
 - Solid Waste Facility Requirements
 - Permitting
 - Financial Assurance





Current Rulemaking Steps

- Informal Public Input Sessions
 - 5 held between March-August
- Formal Rulemaking Process
 - Waste Management Council
 - DES Legal Unit
 - State Legislature
- Update Forms/Applications
 - Over 40 forms





New Rules

- General Permit Program
 - New Section of Existing Permitting chapter
- Food Waste Diversion funding
 - HB2, signed 6/29/23





Solid Waste General Permits

- RSA 149-M:29-a
- General Permit Program Rules
 - Motor Vehicle Salvage/Recycling Facilities
 - Car Crushing Activities
 - Others (future)





Food Waste Grant Program – RSA 149-R



- Food Waste Ban
 - Effective February 2025
 - 1+ tons food waste/week
- Solid Waste Management Fund
 - \$500,000
 - Matching Grant Program

- Env-Sw 100 definitions
- Those without amendment



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
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NH Solid Waste Management Plan Update



- 8 Goals, 76 Actions
- Largely focused on achievement of state's disposal reduction goal
 - Reduce disposal of MSW & C&D 25% by 2030, 45% by 2050
- 10-year implementation timeframe
 - October 2022 September 2032
- Actions listed under each goal are grouped into 5 main "strategies" (i.e., approaches to achieving the goals)
 - Education/Outreach
 - Data Collection/Research
 - Incentives
 - Regulations & Permitting
 - Legislation







- 1. Reduce quantity of solid waste generated
- 2. Reduce toxicity of the solid waste stream
- 3. Maximize diversion from disposal
- 4. Ensure adequate capacity for management of NH's waste
- 5. Develop local markets for diversion
- 6. Support state & federal climate change initiatives
- 7. Support state & federal environmental justice initiatives
- 8. Ensure sustainable funding sources to support solid waste initiatives



Plan Implementation

- Collaboration will be key
 - NHDES has a primary role but other stakeholders can play a role
- Current/Upcoming initiatives:
 - Received federal funding from EPA to support planning & research
 - Statewide Waste Characterization Study
 - Disposal and recycling information on NHDES website
 - Food waste disposal ban affects entities generating 1 ton/week
 - Grants for food waste diversion projects
- Continuing Input from NH Solid Waste Working Group







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
